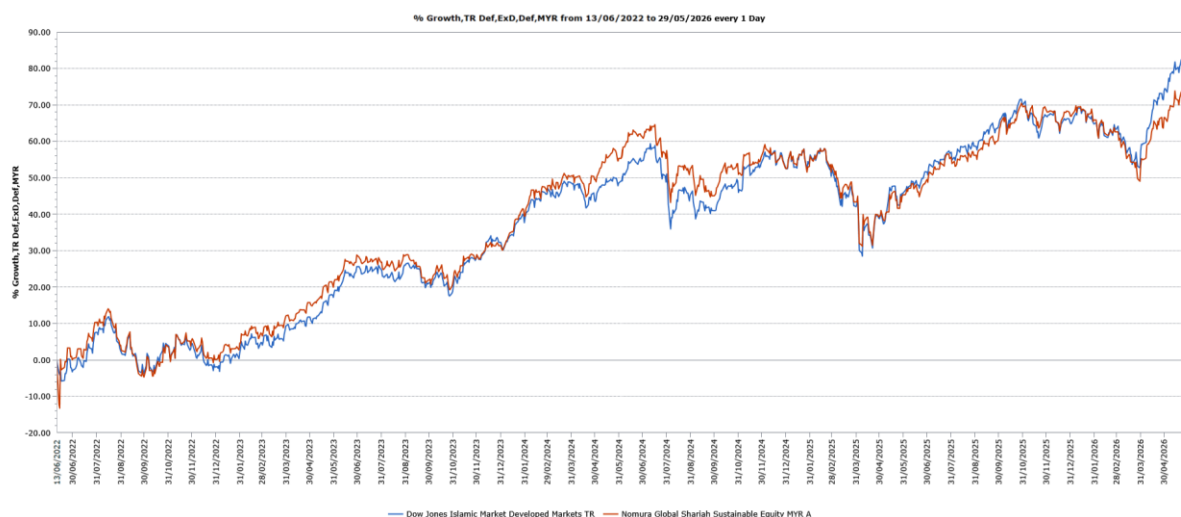

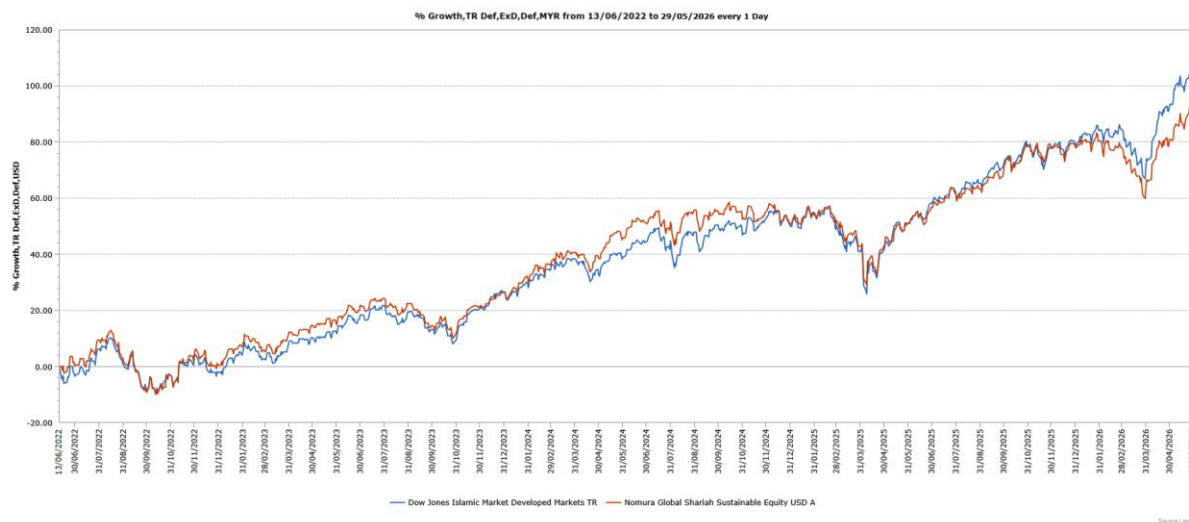

3.1 Performance for the period from 1 June 2025 to 31 May 2026

Fund – MYR Class A

For the period under review from 1 June 2025 to 31 May 2026, MYR Class A has registered +24.21% return. Compared to the Benchmark return of +28.05%, MYR Class A has underperformed the Benchmark by 3.84%. The Net Asset Value (NAV) per unit of MYR Class A as at 31 May 2025 was RM 1.4532 compared to the NAV per unit as at 31 May 2026 of RM 1.8049. On the total NAV basis, MYR Class A's NAV stood at RM 59.93 million as at 31 May 2026. During the period under review, MYR Class A has not declared any income distribution.

Fund – USD Class A

For the period under review from 1 June 2025 to 31 May 2026, USD Class A has registered +30.26% return. Compared to the Benchmark return of +37.47%, USD Class A has underperformed the Benchmark by 7.21%. The Net Asset Value (NAV) per unit of USD Class A as at 31 May 2025 was USD 1.5093 compared to the NAV per unit as at 31 May 2026 of USD 1.9660. On the total NAV basis, USD Class A's NAV stood at USD 9.54 million as at 31 May 2026. During the period under review, USD Class A has not declared any income distribution.

3.2 Review of Market for the period from 1 June 2025 to 31 May 2026

Two major macro events including US reciprocal tariff and US-Iran war not only heightened global geopolitical tensions but also introduced much higher market volatility as observed in sharp swings of the VIX index. While market was very concerned about the reversal of inflation towards the upside that might force the transition into tightening monetary policy with rate hikes in the US, US president Trump's decision-making to reverse the original course of actions helped to ease market concern of lingering market implications. Multiple attempts of threatening and renegotiations to resolve in market friendly outputs resulted in market to believe that "Trump Always Chicken Out". Albeit the macro uncertainties, fiscal stimulus - One Big Beautiful Bill Act well supported US resilient consumer spending and ISM PMI indicators above 50 which boosted market confidence in investing riskier assets and cyclical stocks. EU and Japan market on the other hand announced rate hike to manage rising inflation rate in the absence of hawkish commentary tone that could severely restrict the economic growth.

AI spending as guided by US major IT companies continue to trend upwards as cloud revenue growth rate accelerated. The flow through supported the earnings growth revision strongly throughout the whole AI value chain including but not limited to Industrials, Semis, IT hardware and Materials. With broadening AI opportunities away from the mega cap chip companies and hyperscalers into the supply chain which is heavily concentrated in Asia market including Taiwan, Japan and South Korea, these markets attracted more global inflows and outperformed US market. The relatively value multiples also garnered strong investor interest which resulted in steady multiples re-rating closing the gap against the US market. We reinforced our positive view on AI structural trend as we learned more about the supply chain bottlenecks and innovation led transition demand via our heavier IT sector exposures including new initiations such as Murata Manufacturing, Cisco and Micron.

For the period under review, MYR Class A delivered very strong return performance with a net performance of +24.21% but trailed the benchmark by 384bps. On the regional level, Asia market delivered the strongest performance as supported by AI theme followed by NA market. With lower underweight in Asia market through the period, allocation in Asia market was positive. However, that was more than offset by negative selections in NA market in which Industrial sector was the main underperformance contributor followed by Healthcare and IT sector. Greatest contributors to the relative performance of the Fund were Murata Manufacturing and Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing. On the other hand, the greatest detractors to the relative performance of the Fund were Boston Scientific and Mastercard.

3.3 Investment Outlook

Throughout the second half of 2026 and into 2027, we have identified several critical macroeconomic developments warranting close monitoring. Few rounds of ceasefire and retaliation between US and Iran are ongoing but market attention in Middle East situation appears to have diminished. Nevertheless, we are vigilant regarding the risk of crude oil price sustaining a wide elevated range of \$70-\$100 per barrel. Should this situation remain unresolved for an unforeseeable period, it could generate sustained and broader economic implications, particularly regarding inflation risk. In such a scenario, central banks may be compelled to adopt a more hawkish monetary policy stance, which would prove less favorable for risk assets.

Encouragingly, US Financials and global Industrial companies which have reported latest quarterly earnings through July 2026 have not flagged major economic concerns that could materially disrupt underlying business operations in the scope of a broader market. US banks broadly reiterated resilient consumption spending and robust capital markets activity, while global Industrial companies reported better order growth with better end market that was well supported by ISM PMI level above 50 which indicates an expansionary environment. We view this as a silver lining amidst the Middle East tension uncertainties.

Recent rate hike announcements by the Bank of Japan and European Central Bank were notably absent of hawkish commentary. In the United States, implied rate futures suggest expectations for two rate increases over the next twelve months, contingent upon inflation developments. While this does not necessarily signal the end of the expansionary cycle, it represents an increasingly prominent risk factor. We intend to remain nimble in rebalancing our growth and defensive exposures in response to potential heightened market volatility driven by these macroeconomic developments.

Market odds indicate that US mid-term election in late 2026 are likely to result in a divided US government beginning January 2027. We believe such an outcome could establish a new regulatory environment that may to lift or reverse some of the policy headwinds including but not limited to Healthcare. To wrap up on the macroeconomic development, we are monitoring fiscal budget discussions surrounding the 17 strategic investments announced by the Takaichi administration, which could provide meaningful support for future earnings growth in the Japanese equity market. From a bottom-up investment perspective, we believe that the most significant risk-reward dynamic in equity markets continue to center on AI-related themes. A notable development over recent quarters has been the narrowing of investment concentration, with capital flows shifting from the Magnificent Seven toward IT hardware and semiconductor industries.

As of end-June 2026, the IT sector comprised 46% of the S&P 500 index—surpassing the peak concentration observed during the internet bubble period. This expansion reflects accelerated earnings growth in the IT sector relative to other sectors, which has attracted valuation multiple re-rating, with certain exceptions for IT companies demonstrating exponential earnings growth exceeding 100% year-over-year. While we do not view this concentration as fundamentally problematic—particularly given positive momentum in the AI structural trend—our concern centers on significantly elevated near-term market expectation and volatility. Substantial capital rotation into the IT sector from all other sectors has created ambitiously high expectations, leaving IT companies with limited margin for error. This dynamic is further intensified by the proliferation of leveraged ETFs and single-stock products across capital markets.

We anticipate that AI capital expenditure growth will remain robust, particularly as companies increasingly utilize debt and equity capital issuance to fund investments. However, we expect the rate of growth to moderate as comparisons become more challenging and would temper share price performance. Accordingly, while we maintain an overweight position in the IT sector, we plan to adopt a more nimble approach to portfolio positioning, with selective allocations designed to create value-added diversification through enhanced allocation and security selection. We expect the pipeline of large-cap and mega-cap technology IPOs over the next twelve months to provide dual effects: uplifting market sentiment while simultaneously tempering investor expectations through increased transparency via publicly disclosed materials previously unavailable. While timing a shift in investor attention remains challenging, we believe it is inevitable that AI-related investment diversification will continue to evolve beyond the current and trailing twelve-month AI beneficiary basket. For example, within AI infrastructure providers, we anticipate market focus will shift toward emerging bottlenecks such as CPUs, optical networking, and advanced technology architecture including but not limited to glass substrate and 800VDC. As the industry transitions toward AI inference stage and agentic AI deployment, we would also expect more new technology developments that could deliver much faster growth rate from a low base.

Finally, with substantial capital expenditure more in place, we expect application layer companies to garner increased attention when they are increasingly proved and viewed as ROI generators through AI-assisted tools. The introduction of broader use-case applications demonstrating sustainably higher organic growth rates over multiple quarters or years should mark a major inflection point in companies' free cash flow generation and share price performance. For instance, the software industry experienced significant underperformance, as it was broadly perceived as vulnerable to eventual AI-driven disruption. However, some cybersecurity companies in the software industry emerged as a notable outlier, delivering performance comparable to IT hardware and semiconductor sectors. This outperformance was attributable to cybersecurity companies successfully demonstrating accelerated growth rates while being positioned as essential infrastructure to defend against AI-assisted cybersecurity threats.

3.4 Strategies Employed for the period from 1 June 2025 to 31 May 2026

For the financial period under review, the Fund has complied with the requirements of the Guidelines on Sustainable and Responsible Investment Funds.

The Fund is managed locally with Nomura Asset Management U.K. Limited as the investment adviser who will provide investment research and stock recommendation in accordance with the investment objective and within the investment restrictions and limits of the Fund. The investment strategies remained unchanged. The Fund applies bottom up approach by selectively invests in equity stocks that possess high quality businesses for long-term capital return, and deliver positive impact in accordance with one of the Fund's six impact goals aligning with United Nation Sustainable Development Goals (UN SDGs). In addition, the Fund stays invested in the market with minimum amount of idle cash for liquidity purposes.

Impact Focus of the Year

Global Access to Clean Drinking Water - The team have been engaging with Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company (TSMC) on water usage and water recycling for the past few years. The most recent engagement was over their fabrication plants (fabs) in Kumamoto, Japan. Due to geopolitical tensions, TSMC has been asked to build fabs in countries such as Japan and the US (which we have written about regarding labour unions). Specifically, we asked for information about water usage and recycling standards in Kumamoto. In past engagements, we learned that water conservation and recycling standards in Taiwan are amongst the best in the world as Taiwan has a shortage of drinking water, especially when there is a drought, which happens more frequently due to climate change. We wanted to know whether the same high standards would be used in Kumamoto. A lot of our investors are based in Japan and are interested to see Kumamoto's groundwater protected. Based on an article that quotes TSMC's ESG disclosures on their Kumamoto fab, we learned that TSMC has reduced its planned water usage by 30% since when the fab was first announced and has committed to groundwater replenishment of over 100% of the used groundwater. TSMC has signed an agreement with the local council to accelerate the promotion of groundwater recharge. The company added that their new Sustainability Report will be published in the following months and that it will contain more detailed data about their water conservation efforts.

The following accounting policies have been used in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the financial statements.

A BASIS OF PREPARATION OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards ("MFRS") and International Financial Reporting Standards. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of financial assets and financial liabilities (including derivative financial instruments) at fair value through profit or loss.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the MFRS and International Financial Reporting Standards requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported financial year. It also requires the Manager to exercise their judgement in the process of applying the Fund's accounting policies. Although these estimates and judgement are based on the Manager's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results may differ.

The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in Note K to the financial statements.

- (i) Standards, amendments to published standards and interpretations that are applicable and effective:

There are no standards, amendments to standards or interpretations that are applicable and effective for annual periods beginning on 1 June 2025 that have a material effect on the financial statements of the Fund.

- (ii) Standards and amendments that have been issued that are applicable to the Fund but not yet effective:

- Amendments to MFRS 9 and MFRS 7 'Amendments to the Classification and Measurement of Financial Instruments' (effective 1 January 2026):
 - The amendments clarify that financial assets are derecognised when the rights to the cash flows expire or when the asset is transferred, and financial liabilities are derecognised at the settlement date (i.e. when the liability is extinguished or qualifies for derecognition);
 - There is an optional exception to derecognise a financial liability at a date earlier than the settlement date if the cash transfer takes place through an electronic payment system, provided that all the specified criteria are met;
 - The amendments also clarify and add further guidance for assessing whether a financial asset meets the solely payments of principal and interest ("SPPI") criterion;
 - There are additional new disclosures for certain instruments with contractual terms that can change cash flows (such as some financial instruments with features linked to the achievement of environment, social and governance targets); and
 - The amendments update the disclosures for equity instruments designated at fair value through other comprehensive income ("FVOCI").

 - The new MFRS introduces a new structure of profit or loss statement.
 - (a) Income and expenses are classified into 3 new main categories:

The Fund is currently still assessing the effect of the above standards and amendments. No other new standards or amendments to standards are expected to have a material effect on the financial statements of the Fund.

B PRESENTATION AND FUNCTIONAL CURRENCY

Items included in the financial statements of the Fund are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Fund operates (the "functional currency"). The financial statements are presented in United States Dollar ("USD"), which is the Fund's presentation and functional currency.

Due to mixed factors in determining the functional currency of the Fund, the Manager has used its judgement to determine the functional currency that most faithfully represents the economic effects of the underlying transactions, events and conditions and have determined the functional currency to be in USD primarily due to the following factors:

- (i) Significant portion of the Fund's investments are denominated in USD.
- (ii) Significant portion of the Fund's cash is denominated in USD for the purpose of making settlement of foreign trades and expenses.
- (iii) Significant portion of the Fund's expenses are denominated in USD.

B PRESENTATION AND FUNCTIONAL CURRENCY (CONTINUED)

Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions or valuation where items are re-measured. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income, except when deferred in other comprehensive income as qualifying cash flow hedges.

C INCOME RECOGNITION

Profit income from Islamic deposits with licensed financial institutions is recognised on an accrual basis using the effective profit method.

Profit income is calculated by applying the effective profit rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset except for financial assets that subsequently become credit-impaired. For credit impaired financial assets, the effective profit rate is applied to the net carrying amount of the financial asset (after deduction of the loss allowance).

Dividend income from quoted Shariah-compliant investments is recognised when the Fund's right to receive payment is established. Dividend income is received from financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss.

Realised gain or loss on sale of quoted Shariah-compliant investments is accounted for as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the investments, determined on a weighted average cost basis.

D TAXATION

Current tax expense is determined according to the Malaysian tax laws at the current rate based upon the taxable income earned during the financial year.

E CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

For the purpose of statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash and bank balance and Islamic deposits with licensed financial institutions with original maturities of three months or less that is readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

F FINANCIAL ASSETS AND FINANCIAL LIABILITIES

(i) Classification

The Fund classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- those to be measured subsequently at fair value through profit or loss ("FVTPL"), and
- those to be measured at amortised cost.

The Fund classifies its Shariah-compliant investments based on both the Fund's business model for managing those financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets. The portfolio of financial assets is managed and performance is evaluated on a fair value basis. The Fund is primarily focused on fair value information and uses that information to assess the assets' performance and to make decisions.

The Fund has not taken the option to irrevocably designate any equity securities as fair value through other comprehensive income. The contractual cash flows of the Fund's debt securities are solely principal and interest, however, these securities are neither held for the purpose of collecting contractual cash flows nor held both for collecting contractual cash flows and for sale. The collection of contractual cash flows is only incidental to achieving the Fund's business model's objective. Consequently, all investments are measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Fund classifies cash and cash equivalents, amount due from Manager and dividends receivable as financial assets measured at amortised cost as these financial assets are held to collect contractual cash flows consisting of the amount outstanding.

The Fund classifies amount due to broker, amount due to Manager, accrued management fee, amount due to Trustee, amount due to Shariah Adviser, payable for auditor's remuneration and other payables and accruals as financial liabilities measured at amortised cost.

(ii) Recognition and measurement

Regular purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on the trade date, the date on which the Fund commits to purchase or sell the asset. Shariah-compliant investments are initially recognised at fair value. Subsequent to initial recognition, financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value.

Financial liabilities are recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

Financial assets are de-recognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the Shariah-compliant investments have expired or have been transferred and the Fund has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

Financial liabilities are de-recognised when it is extinguished, i.e. when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expired.

Unrealised gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of the "financial assets at fair value through profit or loss" category are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income within net gain or loss on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss in the financial year in which they arise.

(ii) Recognition and measurement (continued)

Quoted Shariah-compliant investments are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently re-measured at fair value based on the market price quoted on the relevant stock exchanges at the close of the business on the valuation day, where the close price falls within the bid-ask spread. In circumstances where the close price is not within the bid-ask spread, the Manager will determine the point within the bid-ask spread that is most representative of the fair value.

If a valuation based on the market price does not represent the fair value of the Shariah-compliant securities, for example during abnormal market conditions or when no market price is available, including in the event of a suspension in the quotation of the securities for a period exceeding 14 days, or such shorter period as agreed by the Trustee, then the securities are valued as determined in good faith by the Manager, based on the methods or bases approved by the Trustee after appropriate technical consultation.

Financial assets measured at amortised cost and other financial liabilities are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective profit method.

(iii) Impairment

The Fund measures credit risk and expected credit losses using probability of default, exposure at default and loss given default. The Manager considers both historical analysis and forward-looking information in determining any expected credit loss. The Manager considers the probability of default to be closed to zero as these Shariah-compliant instruments have a low risk of default and the counterparties have a strong capacity to meet their contractual obligations in the near term. As a result, no loss allowance has been recognised based on 12-month expected credit losses as any such impairment would be wholly insignificant to the Fund.

Significant increase in credit risk

A significant increase in credit risk is defined by the Manager as any contractual payment which is more than 30 days past due.

Definition of default and credit-impaired financial assets

Any contractual payment which is more than 90 days past due is considered credit-impaired.

Write-off

The Fund writes off financial assets, in whole or in part, when it has exhausted all practical recovery efforts and has concluded there is no reasonable expectation of recovery. The assessment of no reasonable expectation of recovery is based on unavailability of debtor's sources of income or assets to generate sufficient future cash flows to repay the amount. The Fund may write off financial assets that are still subject to enforcement activity. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off will result in impairment gains. There are no write-offs/recoveries during the financial year.

G UNIT HOLDERS' CAPITAL

The unit holders' contribution to the Fund meet the criteria of the definition of puttable instruments to be classified as financial liability under MFRS132 "Financial Instruments: Presentation".

The Fund issues cancellable units, in two classes of units, known respectively as MYR Class A and USD Class A, which are cancelled at the unit holders' option and do not have identical features subject to restrictions as stipulated in the Prospectus and Securities Commission Malaysia's ("SC") Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds. The units are classified as financial liabilities.

Cancellable units can be put back to the Fund at any time for cash equal to a proportionate share of the Fund's net asset value ("NAV") of respective classes. The outstanding units are carried at the redemption amount that is payable at the date of the statement of financial position if the unit holders exercise the right to put back the unit to the Fund.

Units are created and cancelled at the unit holders' option at prices based on the Fund's NAV per unit of respective classes at the close of business on the relevant dealing day. The Fund's NAV per unit of respective classes is calculated by dividing the net assets attributable to unit holders of respective classes with the total number of outstanding units of respective classes.

H AMOUNT DUE FROM/(TO) BROKER

Amount due from/to broker represent receivables for Shariah-compliant securities sold and payables for Shariah-compliant securities purchased that have been contracted for but not yet settled or delivered on the statement of financial position date respectively.

These amounts are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost. At each reporting date, the Fund shall measure the loss allowance on amounts due from broker at an amount equal to the lifetime expected credit losses if the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition. If, at the reporting date, the credit risk has not increased significantly since initial recognition, the Fund shall measure the loss allowance at an amount equal to 12-month expected credit losses. Significant financial difficulties of the broker, probability that the broker will enter bankruptcy or financial reorganisation, and default in payments are all considered indicators that a loss allowance may be required.

Any contractual payment which is more than 90 days past due is considered credit impaired.

I DERIVATIVE

A derivative is any contract that gives rise to both a financial asset of one enterprise and a financial liability or equity instrument of another enterprise.

The Fund's derivative comprise Islamic forward foreign currency contracts. Derivatives are initially recognised at fair value on the date a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently remeasured at their fair value. Financial derivative positions will be "marked to market" at the close of each valuation day. Foreign exchange gains or losses on the derivative are recognised in profit or loss when settled or at the date of the statement of financial position at which time they are included in the measurement of the derivative. Derivative instruments that have a negative fair value are presented as liabilities as fair value through profit or loss.

I DERIVATIVE (CONTINUED)

The fair value of Islamic forward foreign currency contracts is determined using forward exchange rates on the date of the statement of financial position, with the resulting value discounted back to present value.

The method of recognising the resulting gain or loss depends on whether the derivative is designated as a hedging instrument, and the nature of the item being hedged. Derivatives that do not qualify for hedge accounting are classified as financial assets/liabilities at fair value through profit or loss.

J INCREASE/(DECREASE) IN NET ASSETS ATTRIBUTABLE TO UNIT HOLDERS

Income not distributed is included in net assets attributable to unit holders.

K CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS IN APPLYING ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Fund makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, rarely equal the related actual results. To enhance the information content of the estimates, certain key variables that are anticipated to have material impact to the Fund's results and financial position are tested for sensitivity to changes in the underlying parameters.

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated by the Manager and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

However, the Manager is of the opinion that there are no accounting policies which require significant judgement to be exercised.

L REALISED AND UNREALISED PORTIONS OF INCREASE OR DECREASE IN NET ASSETS ATTRIBUTABLE TO UNIT HOLDERS

The analysis of realised and unrealised amount portions of or decrease in net assets attributable to unit holders as presented on the statement of comprehensive income is prepared in accordance with SC's Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds.

1 INFORMATION ON THE FUND

Nomura Global Shariah Sustainable Equity Fund (the "Fund") was constituted pursuant to the execution of a Master Deed (the "Deed") dated 29 March 2022 entered into between Nomura Asset Management Malaysia Sdn Bhd (the "Manager") and Deutsche Trustees Malaysia Berhad (the "Trustee").

On 22 April 2022, the Fund has been approved by the SC to qualify as a Sustainable Responsible Investment ("SRI") Fund under the Guidelines on Sustainable Responsible Investment Funds. The Fund was launched on 23 May 2022 and will continue its operations until terminated by the Manager or the Trustee as provided under Clause 12 of the Deed.

The Fund may invest in any of the following assets, subject to the Deeds, the Fund's objective, the Guidelines, the requirements of the SC and all relevant laws:

- (a) Shariah-compliant equities and Shariah-compliant equity-related securities;
- (b) Islamic money market instruments;
- (c) Islamic deposits with financial institutions;
- (d) Islamic derivative for hedging purposes;
- (e) units or shares in Islamic collective investment schemes; and
- (f) any other form of Shariah-compliant investments as may be permitted by the SC from time to time that is in line with the Fund's objective.

All investments will be subjected to the SC's Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds, the Deed and the objective of the Fund.

The Fund aims to achieve long-term capital growth.

The Manager is a company incorporated in Malaysia. The principal activities of the Manager are establishment and management of unit trust funds, and asset management including providing fund management services to private clients.

The Fund maintains sufficient level of liquid assets, after consultation with the Trustee, to meet anticipated payments and cancellation of units by the unit holders. Liquid assets comprise cash, deposits with licensed financial institutions and other instruments which are capable of being converted into cash within 7 days. The Fund aims to reduce its liquidity risk by maintaining a prudent level of liquid assets.

Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the ability of an issuer or a counter party to make timely payments of profit or principals payment on the maturity date. This may lead to a default in the payment of principal and interest and ultimately a reduction in the value of the Fund. In the case of the Fund, the Manager will endeavor to minimise the risk by selecting only licensed financial institutions with acceptable credit ratings.

Credit risk arising from placements of Islamic deposits with licensed financial institutions is managed by ensuring that the Fund will only place Islamic deposits in reputable licensed financial institutions.

Credit risk arising from bank balances is managed by ensuring they are held by parties with credit rating of AA or higher.

For amount due from Manager, the settlement terms of the proceeds from the creation of units receivable from the Manager are governed by the SC's Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds.

Capital risk

The capital of the Fund is represented by net assets attributable to unit holders of USD24,589,010 (2025: USD17,008,416). The amount of net assets attributable to unit holders can change significantly on a daily basis as the Fund is subject to daily subscriptions and redemptions at the discretion of the unit holders. The Fund's objective when managing capital is to safeguard the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern in order to provide returns for the unit holders and benefits for other stakeholders and to maintain a strong capital base to support the development of the Shariah-compliant investment activities of the Fund.

Country risk

The risk of price fluctuation in foreign securities may arise due to political, financial and economic events in foreign countries. If this occurs, there is possibility that the NAV of the Fund may be adversely affected.

Fund management risk

There is the risk that the management company may not adhere to the investment mandate of the respective fund. With close monitoring by various relevant internal parties, investment management system being incorporated with limits and controls, and regular reporting to the senior management team, the management company is able to manage such risk. The Trustee has an oversight function over management of the Fund by the management company to safeguard the interests of the unit holders.

Fair value estimation

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (i.e. an exit price).

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities traded in active market (such as publicly traded derivatives and trading securities) are based on quoted market prices at the close of trading on the financial year end date.

A financial instrument is regarded as quoted in an active market if quoted prices are readily and regularly available from an exchange, dealer, broker, industry group, pricing service, or regulatory agency, and those prices represent actual and regularly occurring market transactions on an arm's length basis.

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market is determined by using valuation techniques. The Fund uses a variety of methods and makes assumptions that are based on market conditions existing at each financial year end date. Valuation techniques used for non-standardised financial instruments such as options, currency swaps and other over-the-counter derivatives, include the use of comparable recent arm's length transactions, reference to other instruments that are substantially the same, discounted cash flow analysis, option pricing models and other valuation techniques commonly used by market participants making the maximum use of market inputs and relying as little as possible on entity-specific inputs.

The fair values are based on the following methodology and assumptions:

- (i) The carrying value is a reasonable estimate of fair value for cash and cash equivalents.
- (ii) The carrying value less impairment provision of receivables and payables are assumed to approximate their fair values. The carrying value of the financial assets and financial liabilities approximate their fair value due to their short term nature.

Valuations are therefore adjusted, where appropriate, to allow for additional factors including model risk, liquidity risk and counterparty risk.

Fair value hierarchy

The Fund adopted MFRS 13 "Fair Value Measurement" in respect of disclosures about the degree of reliability of fair value measurement. This requires the Fund to classify fair value measurements using a fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements. The fair value hierarchy has the following levels:

- Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active market for identical assets or liabilities.
- Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices included within level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (that is, as prices) or indirectly (that is, derived from prices).
- Level 3: Inputs for the asset and liability that are not based on observable market data (that is unobservable inputs).

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety is determined on the basis of the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety. For this purpose, the significance of an input is assessed against the fair value measurement in its entirety. If a fair value measurement uses observable inputs that require significant adjustment based on unobservable inputs, that measurement is a Level 3 measurement.

Assessing the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement in its entirety requires judgement, considering factors specific to the asset or liability.

The determination of what constitutes 'observable' requires significant judgement by the Fund. The Fund considers observable data to be that market data that is readily available, regularly distributed or updated, reliable and verifiable, not proprietary, and provided by independent sources that are actively involved in the relevant market.
